The Survey Says

If you're a television game show "junkie," you may remember Family Feud where contestants had to guess the responses of game show surveys. Remember, "And the survey says...?"

Senior dean, Dan Collins, presented a Monday-Morning meditation opening day to the Upper School that included an overview of the findings of a BISSNET survey conducted last year on the "Climate of the School." He said, "Over a third of the students reported that they sometimes or frequently hear racist, sexist, or homophobic remarks at school. The survey also showed that the overwhelming majority of these remarks referred to another student's weight and appearance or supposed sexual orientation. Perhaps most disturbingly, about a third of the survey respondents were uncertain that a faculty member would do anything about such remarks if they were reported."

Senior Elisa Peebles, a member of a bullying and harassment focus group at Nichols, took the podium on the quadrangle at the All School meeting the following week. Earlier, the focus group had discussed the symbolism in "burying the words" and her message to the assembled was that "students need to accept, foster, and make it work." Her challenge to the students was to use "this moment to launch us into a year where we make bullying and harassment an issue to deal with and resolve. A part of our action plan... is to have students become involved in raising awareness. ...It really starts and is supported by your personal dedication to how you talk to your friends and peers."

Not long after Elisa's plea, I overheard some sophomore boys calling each other names while attending a field hockey game. I turned around to remind them about "burying the words." As Dr. Collins pointed out in his earlier speech, "That's not censorship. ...It's saying that in our community, we're not going to label people. Instead we're going to listen."

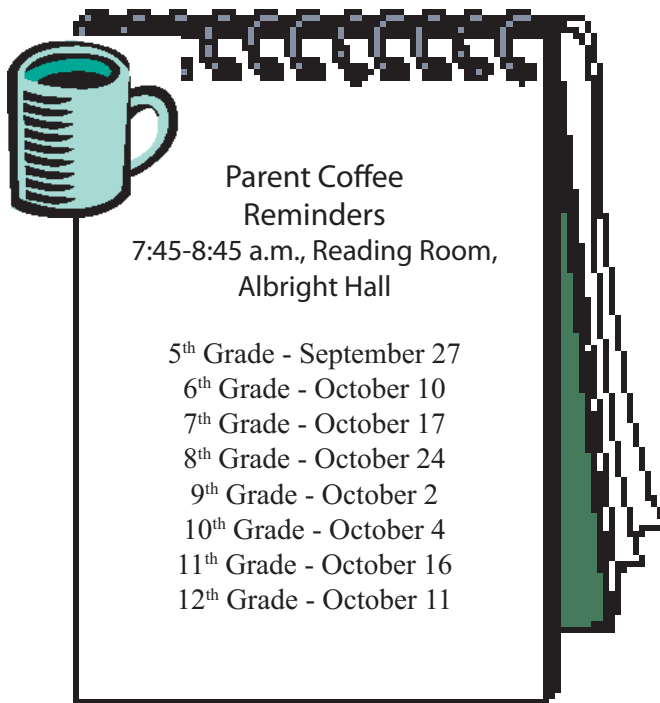
By the way, the survey also said, "Over 62 percent of student respondents reported that they'd never been harassed at school." That statistic has to be a reflection of family values. Let's keep reminding everyone to listen and not label. Thank you for your help!

CHARACTER CORNER

Each June, the Nichols Middle School students are asked to complete a survey that evaluates the Character Education portion of the Advisory Period. Because this is not an empirically sound survey (not all students responded), the results are not definitive. The results, however, are interesting and encouraging, and are reflective of the overall perception of the atmosphere at the Middle School.

Overall, students felt that they connected well with their advisor and had ample time to talk to him/her if they had a problem. Students also believed that there are adults at the MS that they could go to for help and that their problems would be handled in a satisfactory way. The number of students who responded in this way increased from previous years. Regarding questions about bullying behavior -- either witnessed or personally experienced -- the numbers show that the MS falls in line with national averages (about 15% of students experience bullying). According to our survey, 14% of students responded that they are bullied on a regular basis.

The results from these surveys are compiled and used to improve our programs. There are spaces, too, for students to add topics that they both enjoyed discussing and feel should be added. Our Character Education Program is seen as a "work in progress." Every effort is being made to improve the overall environment at Nichols Middle School. We truly believe that one child experiencing bullying is one too many. Although the goal to eradicate bullying completely is somewhat unrealistic, our programs strive to educate children on how to defend oneself appropriately and how to "make it right" when you hurt another individual.

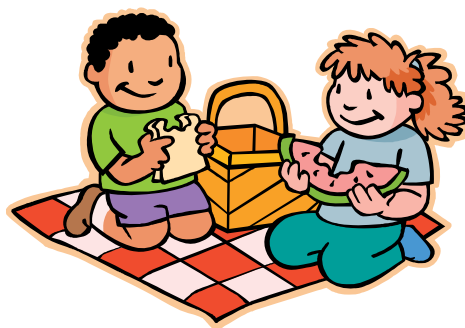

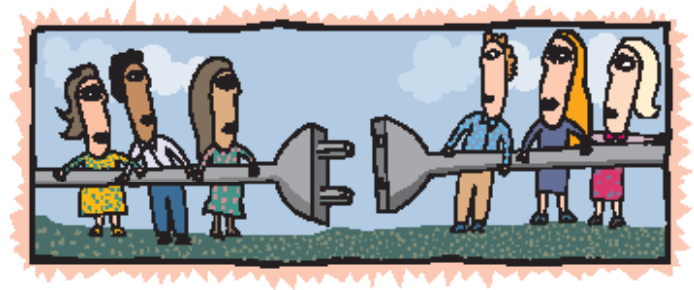

College Connection

THE COLLEGE SEARCH

Here's a quick synopsis of what to expect. Please use our college handbook as a resource; it is available on the Nichols website under College Counseling.



Students

Freshman Year – Take a strong academic schedule. Get involved in extracurricular and volunteer activities. Begin a self-inventory: What subjects do you like? What outside activities or hobbies do you like?

Sophomore Year – Continue with above. You will take the Practice PSAT in October. Pick a few activities you will want to continue over the next three years. Look for a summer job or activity that will relate to your interests.

Junior Year – Continue with a strong academic schedule and performance. (This is the last time colleges will see final grades.) In October, take the PSAT. Register for SAT and/or ACT tests that juniors usually begin in January. The Junior Parents College Night in late January kicks-off the formal college counseling process at Nichols. In February, you will schedule an appointment with your college counselor. Beginning in March, encourage your parents to schedule an appointment with your counselor. Attend Buffalo's National College Fair in the spring and begin visiting colleges over school breaks. Plan for a summer job or activity that relates to academic or extracurricular interests. Contact college coaches if you hope to play an intercollegiate sport. Register for the NCAA Clearinghouse, if appropriate. Late summer: complete the brag sheet and begin drafts of college essays.

Senior Year: Continue with a strong academic schedule and performance. (Colleges will see mid-year grades and may ask for first marking period grades if you apply to an early action or early decision program). Visit colleges. Continue discussions with your college counselor. Ask two teachers for letters of recommendation (write thank-you notes to those who write for you). Research financial aid options and scholarships. Submit applications and transcript requests ahead of deadlines. Inform your college counselor and teacher recommenders of college decisions. *Keep up your grades all year long--they will determine your academic readiness for next year!*

Parents

You no longer have to wait until your child's high school senior year if you are concerned about need-based financial aid. The government has set up an online program for families to enter financial information to help determine how much they will be expected to contribute (the Estimated Family Contribution) to their child's college education on a yearly basis. You will need your most recent 1040 tax forms to help answer the questions. To log on to the FAFSA Forecaster (FAFSA4caster), go to www.fafsa.ed.gov. This new computer program automatically generates a student's PIN that he/she will need when the actual FAFSA is officially filed in January of the senior year.

Beginning in spring of the junior year, the college counselors also strongly encourage parents/guardians to make appointments with them to discuss the college process. Good communication with students and families is crucial during this process!

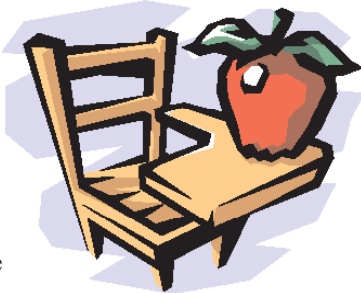
